Title: Fusion of Art and Technology in Professional Cycling Sportswear Design

Abstract: Cycling sportswear that meets the multiple functional requirements of thermal

comfort, biomechanical protection and aesthetics is highly demanded by cyclists. These multiple functional requirements lead to innovations in cycling sportswear design based on multi-disciplinary knowledge integration and fusion of art and technology. A theoretical model for cycling sportswear design is developed in this paper to model the design process by systematically integrating different knowledge and identifying the relationships between them. This model demonstrates that the design innovation of cycling sportswear is the fusion of aesthetic design with thermal and biomechanical functional design, which meets cyclists' demand for

wearing comfort, relief of muscle fatigue and beautiful appearance.

Title: McLuhan and the Legacy of Popular Modernism

Abstract: The academic world of the 1960s reacted to Marshall McLuhan's ideas with disdain.

By declaring that the era of the printed book was over and that television was changing human nature and the social fabric, he was seen as a scholar who had 'gone over to the other side'. McLuhan himself often claimed that he was misunderstood in this respect: he was not proselytizing for television, but simply insisting that we look honestly at the current media culture. While McLuhan may indeed have been more at home in the world of books, the impact of his writings as

well as his persona reinforced a major trend of the 1960s: the rising status of popular culture and the breakdown of hierarchy in the arts. At the same time, McLuhan's theory of media clearly marked him as a modernist and put him in

implicit dialogue with the modernist art theory of the period.

Title: From Appropriation to Translation: Localizing Rap Music to Finland

Author: Mervi Tervo

Abstract: This article explores the Finnish rap-music scene by using a sample of music videos

released between 1998 and 2010. The main aim is to investigate how rap music has been transformed and localized to fit the Finnish context. The topics of the songs (lyrics), the staging of the music videos (visualization), and musical background influences were categorized and analyzed. I argue that rap's localization has not proceeded in a straightforward fashion in Finland, but consists of multiple parallel and intertwining processes. Rap artists balance between the origins of the hip-hop culture (appropriation), the local contexts (localization), and the increasing trend of mixing music genres (hybridization). The result is a diverse Finnish rap-music scene, in which artists carry different identifications and create links with specific

audiences.

Title: CANNIBALIZING OVID: ALLUSION, STORYTELLING AND DECEPTION IN JUVENAL 15.

Abstract: Satire 15 is not a straightforward narrative about Egyptian practices of cannibalism,

but a stylized, rhetorical exercise in intertextuality. Juvenal undermines his narratorial authority through an ongoing engagement with Ovid's Metamorphoses. Juvenal hints that storytellers may sometimes be deceitful, and in turn he seems to embrace this role. Throughout the satire, intertextuality takes the place of proof as both exempla and argumentation are corroborated by means of Ovidian allusion. As a result, the cannibalization at the core of the satire may be read as analogous to

Juvenal's literary duplicity.

Title: Tobit and the Genesis Apocryphon: Toward a Family Portrait

Abstract: The Aramaic Dead Sea Scrolls provide a unique window into Second Temple Jewish

literature and scriptural interpretation that is only beginning to gain sustained scholarly attention. A major question regarding these texts, and addressed preliminarily in this essay, is the extent to which they may constitute a coherent corpus of related works. Tobit and the Genesis Apocryphon are two Aramaic compositions that have benefited from extensive individual analysis but have not been studied alongside each other. A close, comparative reading of both texts reveals a surprising correspondence in their topics of interest, scriptural source material, literary techniques, narrative structures, and idiom. These similarities suggest a close family resemblance between Tobit and the Apocryphon, which were likely written in the same or associated scribal circles during the early Hellenistic period. The relationship between these two texts makes a case for similar comparisons of other Aramaic scrolls and suggests a more tightly formed

constellation of affiliated texts than has been previously recognized.

Title: Metrolingual art: Multilingualism and heteroglossia.

Abstract: Metrolingualism can be defined as the contemporary practice of creative uses, or

mixing, of different linguistic codes in predominantly urban contexts, transcending established social, cultural, political and historical boundaries, identities and ideologies (Otsuiji & Pennycook, 2010). The present paper examines how this term can be applied to theorizing instances of contemporary text art that combine two or more languages, or that transform known linguistic codes into 'fake' or fantasy ones. The paper extends the scope of metrolingualism beyond multilingualism and includes a multimodal dimension, the mixing of genres, styles, accents, texts' materiality, as well as their emplacement and pragmatic relevance. Finally, the paper suggests a reframing of metrolingualism as a manifestation of heteroglossia. International multimedia and performance artists whose work is analysed include Laurie Anderson, Xu Bing, Wenda Gu, Song Dong, Zhang Peili and Claire Fontaine.

Title: <u>Deixis: This and That in Written Narrative Discourse</u>

Abstract: The existing literature presents conflicting models of how this and that access

different segments of a written discourse, frequently relying on implicit analogies with spoken discourse. On the basis of this literature, we hypothesized that in written discourse, this more readily accesses the adjacent/right frontier of a

preceding chunk of text, whereas that more readily accesses the distant/left. We tested this hypothesis in two eye-tracking experiments, one sentence completion experiment, and one corpus study. Our results showed that both this and that access the adjacent frontier more easily than the distant. Contrary to existing theories, this accessed the distant frontier more frequently and easily than that. We propose a processing model integrating segmented discourse representation theory's concept of the left/distant leaf with Grosz and Sidner's attentional and intentional model and Garrod and Sandford's focus framework model, suggesting an important role for working memory and emphasizing the different production modes of readers and writers.

Title: <u>Semantic values in higher-order semantics</u>

Abstract: Recently, some philosophers have argued that we should take quantification of any

(finite) order to be a legitimate and irreducible, sui generis kind of quantification. In particular, they hold that a semantic theory for higher-order quantification must itself be couched in higher-order terms. Øystein Linnebo has criticized such views on the grounds that they are committed to general claims about the semantic values of expressions that are by their own lights inexpressible. I show that Linnebo's objection rests on the assumption of a notion of semantic value or contribution which both applies to expressions of any order, and picks out, for each expression, an extra-linguistic correlate of that expression. I go on to argue that higher-orderists can plausibly reject this assumption, by means of a hierarchy of notions they can use

to describe the extra-lingustic correlates of expressions of different orders.

Title: Samson the Man-Child: Failing to Come of Age in the Deuteronomistic History.

Abstract: In recent decades, biblical scholars have shown convincingly that a key feature of

the narrative depiction of Samson is the hero's liminality, his status as a character caught "betwixt and between" two different worlds or states of being. Most often the discussion of Samson's liminality draws attention to his perpetual location at the border between nature and culture or the worlds of men and women-freely crossing

these borders, but never staying long on one side or the other. This article shows that a central aspect of Samson's liminality has yet to be illuminated: the failure of this man-child ever definitively to cross the threshold into adulthood. The character's impressive strength, rhetorical eloquence, and long hair are telling marks of manhood in ancient Israelite literature, as recent work on masculinity in the Hebrew Bible has recognized. However, alongside these manly traits Samson simultaneously demonstrates characteristics associated with boyish immaturity that point to a failure to transition to manhood. The article identifies the indicators of Samson's immaturity through a close reading of the Samson cycle informed by the depiction of boyhood in the Hebrew Bible and by social-scientific research on male maturation. It then offers suggestions inspired by folklore studies on the possible purpose of tales of arrested development such as this one and its potential Sitz im Leben in an ancient Israelite context at the time of its original composition. The study concludes with a discussion of the literary function of Samson's failure to come of age in Judges and the larger Deuteronomistic history.

Title: Youth using national symbols in constructing identities

Abstract: Artefacts containing national or ethnic symbols, such as flags and maps, are

frequently used by 14-year-old youth in a multiethnic, suburban municipality in Stockholm. Appearing as ornaments or trinkets to outsiders, to the initiated they are distinctive group markers displaying multiple political and ideological affiliations. As visual symbols these artefacts invoke communicative, but non-verbal, processes: they interpellate viewers who answer with their reactions. Thus these objects serve to both banally reproduce nationalism and ethnicity and to serve as identity markers. These identities are primarily inclusive and non-aggressive. The symbols do not seem to be a sign of resistance to mainstream Swedish society in line with much work in the field of youth culture. Instead, they are used as a proud, visual display of additional identities complementing a Swedish identity. Ethnicity research often covers linguistic markers or ethnic and national identities. In contrast, the area of youth consumption of nationalism, in the form of objects featuring national, ethnic and religious symbols, is as yet not well documented. Based on a year-long fieldwork in a junior high school, this paper documents ways in which minority group students handle material artefacts and what these symbols involved mean to them.

Title: Ethnicity, Culture and Park Design: Case Studies of Urban Parks in American

Chinatowns

Abstract: This paper examines the role of ethnicity and culture in the making of urban parks. It

focuses on neighbourhood parks in three Chinatowns to explore how park design that addresses the social and cultural needs of the user groups affects park uses. The study employs a combination of field observation, personal interviews, and archival research to examine how the park is used by the ethnic community, uses which adapt or subvert the dominant forms of public space and public life. While the case studies reveal the unique cultural practices of the Chinese as an ethnic group, the analysis also provides general insight into the association between park design and the level of integration of park space into the everyday life of ethnic minorities.

Title: Establishing and Adhering to Sexual Consent: The Association between Reading

Magazines and College Students' Sexual Consent Negotiation

Abstract: Content analyses have cataloged the sexual scripts present in magazines largely

because of their perceived value to readers and their potential role as sex educators. Although it is generally agreed that magazines have the potential to influence sexual attitudes and behavioral intentions, the effects of this medium are not as frequently researched as are other forms of media. The current study tested whether exposure to magazines was associated with intentions related to sexual consent negotiation. A survey of 313 college students indicated that exposure to men's magazines was significantly associated with lower intentions to seek sexual consent and lower intentions to adhere to decisions about sexual consent. In contrast, exposure to women's magazines was significantly associated with greater intentions to refuse unwanted sexual activity. Overall, the findings of this study further reinforce the critical need for responsible and realistic portrayals of sex in entertainment media,

specifically magazines.

Title: MARXISM, GENDER AND MEDIATED MEMORIES OF NATIONAL SOCIALISM: THE

PARADOXICAL CASE OF CHRISTA WOLF'S KINDHEITSMUSTER (1976)

Abstract: This article explores ambivalences in the representation of women's participation in

the Third Reich in Christa Wolf's Kindheitsmuster (1976). Its thematic and aesthetic departure from the GDR's official stance towards National Socialism is well-noted. As this article demonstrates, however, Wolf's subversive feminine and moral perspective on the Nazi past also relies on an ideal of human interaction, embodied in some of the female protagonists. This leads Wolf to reinstate the idealised gender norms that traditionally define the memory of National Socialism. Her association of women with essential values further clashes with institutional Marxism's emphasis

on the historical, and therefore changeable, nature of man, his social relations, and of gendered oppression. This article considers Wolf's paradoxical departure from and reinscription of the state-sanctioned model of history in light of the Marxist texts that have shaped Wolf's interpretation of fascism, paying particular attention to the place of the Frankfurt School's concept of instrumental reason and J.J. Bachofen's notion of matriarchy in her feminist and historical understanding. An examination of the ambivalent construction of gender and guilt in Kindheitsmuster raises important questions about how gender functions symbolically in the left-wing texts that came to shape post-war interpretations of National Socialism in both Germanies.

Title: Towards linking libraries and Wikipedia: automatic subject indexing of library

records with Wikipedia concepts

Abstract: In this article, we first argue the importance and timely need of linking libraries and

Wikipedia for improving the quality of their services to information consumers, as such linkage will enrich the quality of Wikipedia articles and at the same time increase the visibility of library resources which are currently overlooked to a large degree. We then describe the development of an automatic system for subject indexing of library metadata records with Wikipedia concepts as an important step towards library–Wikipedia integration. The proposed system is based on first identifying all Wikipedia concepts occurring in the metadata elements of library records. This is then followed by training and deploying generic machine learning algorithms to automatically select those concepts which most accurately reflect the core subjects of the library materials whose records are being indexed. We have assessed the performance of the developed system using standard information retrieval measures of precision, recall and F-score on a dataset consisting of 100 library metadata records manually indexed with a total of 469 Wikipedia concepts. The evaluation results show that the developed system is capable of achieving an

averaged F-score as high as 0.92.
